











Female, Males, First Generations

In the academic year 2021-2022, Hasanuddin University had a diverse student body. There were a total of 38,169 students including undergraduate and postgraduate students, with 15,268 (40%) males and 22,901 (60%) females.





Furthermore, Hasanuddin University commits to supporting first-generation learners, and in that academic year, 29.45% of the total student population identified as first-generation learners. First-generation learners are students whose parents or guardians have not completed a bachelor's degree. This percentage has shown a positive trend over the past ten years, highlighting Hasanuddin University's dedication to fostering inclusivity and access to higher education.
















Academic Health Center Building

Hasanuddin University Hospital initiated the development of the Academic Health Center Building, supported by funding from KfW (Kreditanstalt für Wiederaufbau) Germany, as part of the Hasanuddin University Hospital development project. This state-of-the-art facility, known as the Unhas Academic Health Center, serves as an integrated hub for educational and clinical skills training. It contains the Medical Rehabilitation Center and Trauma Center, featuring various functional rooms. In the upcoming second phase, additional medical equipment will be incorporated to enhance the capacity for five specialized services, along with the completion of other essential project components.













Halal and Health Center Building FKM Unhas



The Faculty of Public Health of Hasanuddin University embarked on the construction of the Halal and Health Center Building, a transformative project that aims to address the intersection of public health and halal product accessibility. This development is a collaborative effort, involving partnerships with various stakeholders. The Halal and Health Center (H2C) represents a tangible manifestation of Unhas' commitment to fostering a healthier campus environment while simultaneously contributing to the broader community's well-being by ensuring the availability of halal-certified products.














Wastewater Treatment Plant



Universitas Hasanuddin has a system to prevent polluted water from entering the water system by using a wastewater treatment plant. Universitas Hasanuddin has some wastewater treatment plants. The first wastewater treatment plant is operated in Hasanuddin Education Hospital (medical faculty) and Unhas Hotel and Convention Center. Universitas Hasanuddin recycled its domestic wastewater using the biofilter anaerobic-aerobic with a capacity of 1300 m3/day in which the effluent is streamed and discharged to the drainage.

The effluent is regularly monitored by Dinas Lingkungan Hidup (Department of Living Environment), the results of the effluent have met the quality standard based on the Governor Regulation No. 22 of 2021 on Water Quality Standards.

The wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) has been operated at Hasanuddin University since the beginning of 2022. All the wastewater from domestic activity in student housing has been treated using this biofilter anaerobic-aerobic. The WWTP capacity of the Engineering Faculty of Unhas to be built is 300 m3/day with the existing 104 m3/day, so that the process will be carried out in two stages. In terms of service, it will be divided into three routes, which will serve the Sports Hall, Student Center, Science Techno Park, Researchers House, Student Dormitories, Canteen, Mosque, and Auditorium.

The Establishment of a Task Force for Preventing and Handling Sexual Violence













Sexual violence cases remain alarmingly high in society, with more than 338 thousand reported cases, and an additional 60% going unreported. Universities are particularly susceptible to sexual violence University incidents. Hasanuddin dedicated to creating campus а environment that is safe from sexual violence by implementing a robust system and policy framework as a protective shield for victims.



This comprehensive system encompasses complaint services, educational outreach, and awareness initiatives for the entire academic community. Unhas has established an official Task Force for Preventing and Handling Sexual Violence on Campus, tasked with expeditiously and precisely addressing sexual violence incidents. This task force conducts outreach programs within the university to raise awareness about different categories of sexual violence, some of which may go unrecognized as such, and to provide information about reporting protection procedures for victims and witnesses. These efforts ensure that cases are managed in accordance with legal regulations while also offering psychological those support to affected.



The Establishment of the World Sago Center











Hasanuddin University, in collaboration with the Ministry of Agriculture of the Republic of Indonesia, has developed the World Sago Center, a multidisciplinary research and development center. Prof. Dr. Ir. Dorothea Agnes Rampisela, M.Sc., who is in charge of the program, explained that the sago development program for the Eastern Region of Indonesia was originally an idea conceived by the sago research team at the Faculty of Agriculture, Unhas. This initiative received support from the Minister of Agriculture of the Republic of Indonesia.

The establishment of this center represents a commitment to maximizing the potential benefits of sago, which is abundant in Indonesia. Additionally, the program aims to serve as a platform for promoting the potential of sago, a hidden treasure in the Eastern region of Indonesia. Indonesia possesses a sago land area of 5.5 million hectares, constituting 85% of the world's sago land area of 6.5 million hectares.



As a concrete step toward this the Sago development, Center Building will be constructed and equipped with research facilities for sago product development, research funding, and training. The "World Sago Center" building will be located on the Unhas campus, supporting the Sago Technopark concept initiated by Unhas and JICA for the Tana Luwu area, which includes Palopo City, Luwu Regency, North Luwu Regency, and East Luwu.

Faculty of Dentistry Unhas Holds Healthy Living Counseling for Children with Moderate Mental Disorder









Hasanuddin University's Faculty of Dentistry (FKG) has initiated a Student Village Development Program, focusing on providing Healthy and Hygienic Living Counseling for Children with Moderate Mental Disabilities.

This program is designed to integrate everyday life activities for students aged 10-18, utilizing the principles of science, technology, and art as problem-solving tools. The participants are drawn from families representing a range of socio-economic backgrounds, including middle to lower income households, with parents engaged in diverse occupations such as laborers, farmers, entrepreneurs, and private sector employees.

The central aim of this initiative is to address the challenges encountered by these children and serve as an avenue for fostering their independence through a tailored learning experience.

Surveying Digitally-Based Health Service for People with Disabilities











Hasanuddin University's Faculty of Dentistry has initiated a Student Village Development Program, focusing on providing Healthy and Hygienic Living Counseling for Children with Moderate Intellectual Disabilities. This program is designed to integrate everyday life. The research team from Hasanuddin University carried out a survey focused on the accessibility of digital-based healthcare services for individuals with disabilities. This survey addressed their needs, encountered challenges, and capacity to utilize Information and Communication Technology (ICT) to access healthcare services. This research initiative is a component of the Partnership for Australia program - Indonesia Research (PAIR) and was conducted in collaboration with the Faculty of Information Technology at Monash University.

The overarching objective of this research conducted by Unhas is to offer potential solutions to enhance the accessibility of digital healthcare services for individuals with disabilities. Furthermore, the findings from this study can serve as valuable reference material and considerations for the government when seeking to enhance healthcare services for individuals with disabilities.










Charitable Initiative for Cleft Lip Surgery






The Faculty of Dentistry is committed to improving healthcare access by coordinating complimentary cleft lip surgery across multiple locations in partnership with the government, various communities, foundations, and the Regional Management Association of Indonesian Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons (PABMI). This charitable initiative aimed to provide relief for individuals affected by lip and palate abnormalities, ultimately reducing the prevalence of cleft lip and palate conditions. Cleft lip and palate are congenital irregularities that frequently afflict underserved populations, necessitating comprehensive treatment. The primary and pivotal step in addressing this issue is the surgical closure of the cleft lip and palate.



Unhas Alumni Creates Anti-Violence Education



Therry Alghifary, an alumnus of the Faculty of Engineering class of 2007, is one of the alumni committed to realising peace and education. anti-violence commitment is shown through establishing the "KITA Bhinneka Ika" Foundation, Tunggal foundation engaged in antiviolence education.

He envisioned establishing a nongovernmental organization with the mission of peace and nonviolence education. The KITA Bhinneka Tunggal Ika Foundation was born, which focuses on two things: peace education and antiviolence.

KITA Bhinneka Tunggal Ika Foundation has four activity programs: actively increasing capacity and empowering young leaders who have concerns with the issue of peace and anti-violence, conducting training related to the value of peace and anti-violence education for teachers, and educational community activists.

The foundation also actively builds networks between organizations concerned about peace issues and anti-violence education and conducts workshops or other educational activities.













CONTRIBUTE TO LOCAL AND NATIONAL SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Smart City Program in collaboration with the National Research and Innovation Agency, Regional Planning and Development Agency, and Makassar City Social Service















The Unhas Smart City Team and SDGs Center, National Research and Innovation Agency (BRIN), Regional Development and Planning Agency (Bappeda), and Makassar City Social Service held an FGD Follow-up to Smart City Activities. The Smart City program is a program that aims to map poor areas in the city of Makassar. In this activity, the Smart City Team, BRIN, Bappeda, and Makassar City Social Service discussed the technical implementation of mapping. This mapping of poor areas based on machine learning-based classification of slum areas aimed to support the government providing assistance and prioritising when a disaster occurs.



Community Service: Plastic Waste Shredding Machine by UNHAS Mechanical Engineering Department

The Mechanical Engineering Department Team from the Faculty of Engineering, Unhas organized a valuable community service initiative entitled "Implementation of Plastic Shredding Machines in Waste Banks". This significant activity was carried out in Maccini Sombala Village.

The primary objective of this community service was to introduce and implement plastic shredding machines in local waste banks. The team provided support by supplying these machines and offering comprehensive demonstrations on their efficient operation. The introduction of plastic shredding machines was expected to revolutionize waste management in the community by facilitating easier and more efficient packing of plastics, consequently reducing the overall volume of waste stored.

The Paraikatte Rong Waste Bank Manager expressed his gratitude and emphasized the immense value of having a shredding machine in their waste bank. Drawing from his extensive experience of managing the waste bank for over five years, this machine served a significant customer base of 100 households. The Paraikatte Rong Waste Bank highlighted that the transformative impact of this technology will support their waste management efforts. The integration of shredding machines is poised to streamline their operations and significantly contribute to sustainable waste management practices in the community.

















DEVELOPMENT OF BULU CINDEA VILLAGE AS A HEALTHY VILLAGE TO SUPPORT THE ACHIEVEMENT OF SDGS

The 2022 Healthy Village program by the Student Executive Board of the Faculty of Public Health aimed to address key challenges in Bulu Cindea Village, focusing on waste management, clean and healthy living behavior, and stunting. The program is called "Winslow Healthy Village". Health-related issues hindered Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and were met with tailored solutions conducted by the Student Executive Board of the Public Health Faculty. For example, waste processing training, waste bank establishment, dengue fever counseling, stunting guidance, complementary feeding cooking demos, and distribution of complementary feeding recipe pocketbooks. The program aimed to empower the community and promote healthy villages for SDGs, backed by solid data insights



The Healthy Village program yielded valuable outputs like soft skills books, summaries, videos, posters, and educational products such as the Winslow Healthy Village pocketbook, Jenga blocks with a dengue fever theme, quartet cards addressing stunting, and a snakes and ladders game educating about healthy latrines. These tools not only enhanced understanding but also had the potential to sustain positive changes in Bulu Cindea Village.



















INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Universitas Hasanuddin and MTCRC Korea Agree on Collaboration in the Marine and Fisheries Sector









Hasanuddin University, together with the Marine Technology Cooperation Research Center (MTCRC), collaborate in the field of marine and fisheries. MTCRC is an intergovernmental institution, a research center in the area of Marine Science and Technology that operates on the collaboration of two countries, Indonesia and Korea, in 2018 through the Implementing Arrangement of the Coordinating Ministry for Maritime Affairs and the Korean Ministry of Ocean and Fisheries. The programs to be developed are Marine Science and Technology, Fisheries, and Remote Sensing Technology, including Marine Satellites.
